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Various Parking Fines Set To Increase

Town water quality almost perfect; Council meeting procedures updated by Glenn Jackson

Parking Fines

At the April 24 meeting, Council was asked to implement the Administrative Monetary Penalty System (or AMPS) as an alternative parking enforcement structure. It includes an efficient dispute process and replaces the traditional Provincial Of fencesAct system.

The meeting was held after the publication deadline of this edition of OTR; however, in preparation for that report, staffreviewed the Town's parking fines and requested Council to make amendments for the anticipated AMPS implementation in Mav.

In their review, staff found that "some fines may not be sufficient to function as deterrents to parking offenders, especially for those offences which can impact traffic and/or life-safety (sic)." As a result, at the April 3 meeting, Council increased various fines, including 'no stopping' offences, 'fire routes', and 'fire hydrant' offences.

Six stopping offences saw their fines increase from \$40 to \$60. These include stopping within a school bus loading zone, within an intersection, within 9 metres of a pedestrian crossover, on a sidewalk, in a No Stopping area, and in a prohibited area.

The fine for parking in a fire route \$75 to \$100.

Water Quality Reports

At the March 20 meeting, Council received the 2023 Drinking Water Summary and Annual Reports for both the Stouffville and the Ballantrae/Musselman's Council Members and to the public were Lake distribution systems.

The Ballantrae/Musselman's Lake system received an Inspection Rating

of 100% and a Risk Rating of 0%. The Stouffville system received an Inspection Rating of 94.12% and a Risk Rating of 5.88%.

The Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) conducted its annual inspection from December 22. 2023, to January 29, 2024.

Council Meeting Procedures

At the April 3 meeting, Council approved a series of updates to the Town's Procedural By-law, which governs the "calling, place and proceedings of (Council) Meetings."

Included in the changes were updates to the 'Definitions' section with key additions focusing on Strong Mayor Powers. Regular Council Meeting dates were identified increased from \$125 to \$250, and parking (typically the first and third Wednesdays of within 3 metres of a fire hydrant rose from each month), and rules for the notification of Special Council Meetings were clarified.

> Public Planning Meetings were identified as to be held "at 7 p.m. generally following regular scheduled Council meetings... solely for the purpose of providing the public an opportunity to provide input to Council regarding decisions to be made by Council at a future meeting."

Notifications of meeting agendas to relatively unchanged. Agendas are made available to the public the Thursday before a Wednesday meeting via the Town's

website. A summarized version of the agenda, known as the Council Fact Sheet, is also posted to the Town's website and on various social media accounts proceeding the meeting. An updated version (if needed) is available at the meeting. Fact Sheets are not produced for Public Planning Meetings.

Clarification to amending agendas was also approved by Council. In the interest of transparency, late or separate circulations and revised or amended agendas should be avoided wherever possible. However, where necessary, "revised/addendum agendas will be circulated to Members by electronic mail and posted on the Town's website as soon as possible and not later than forty-eight (48)hours prior to the Meeting."

Other updates to the By-law focus on presentations, deputations, members' Motions, speaking times, closed meetings, and meeting decorum.


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












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














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THE WINDOW'S FINAL GLOW AT **CANDLELIGHT & MEMORIES**

Celebrating Pat Montgomery's Retirement by Julia Jackson



Pat's warm smile and welcoming shop have been a guiding light in the community since 2001. After twenty-two years of tea pouring, parties, shopping, and so much more, Stouffville is celebrating Pat's retirement as Candlelight and Memories Fine Gifts & Tea Room prepares to close its doors.

Candlelight...

The charming house with the porch and dormers nestled just east of the train tracks had sat dormant for some time on Main Street back in 2001. One night, a single candle was lit in a window. The following week, another candle flickered to life in a second window. This continued for eight weeks until every window cast a warm glow and caught the attention of all who passed by.

There is a long tradition of candles being lit in windows to signify welcome, and travelers on the long and weary road would know they had found a place of sanctuary on their journey. This represents so much of Pat's vision for her new shop and though the lighting of candles caused a buzz in town with her unique idea to countdown the weeks to

opening her doors, it truly represented all that this shop would come to be.

After doing the buying for a small school gift shop, Pat dreamed of having her own business. When 6198 Main Street became available, she initially bought it with a hug and a handshake and on November 9, she turned the closed sign to open. She worried that nobody would come, but the shop was quickly filled with customers, joy, and laughter.

...and Memories

Candlelight and Memories has been the place to go for collectables, stuffed animals, local goods, and more. Working alongside the other downtown merchants, Pat ensured she sold items others didn't so the widest variety was offered to residents and visitors.

The store offers so much more than shopping — it offers experiences that last a lifetime. Ask someone who has been in Stouffville for a while about Candlelight and Memories, it is likely they will not only remember shopping there, but have fond memories there as well.

Pat has hosted hundreds of children's birthday parties in the shop. This included dressing up in dresses and feather boas before a grand tea party. Today, visitors to the shop remember having their best birthday parties, thanks to Pat.

The shop was the place to go for high teas, with a wonderful tea selection and delectable scones, people would gather as Pat poured and made all feel welcome. She may not like tea herself, but the shop became known for it.

One of Pat's favourite memories is of

a 4-year-old boy who said to his mom while leaving that he really loved this store because he could feel Jesus in there. While recounting the story, it still brings tears to Pat's eyes because this is such a big part of why this place is so important to her, making people feel that they "could come here when hurting, or lonely," and she could put her arm around them and know they were supported.

She fondly remembers one evening when a young man dressed in all black arrived at her door. He had just moved to Stouffville and wasn't fitting in at his new high school. Pat of course took time to chat with him and got to know him, and knew he just needed someone to talk to. Now, he comes by to visit as a young dad.

When you walk through the front door, a large wooden staircase leads up to a cute loft that overlooks the store below. This loft has become a little haven for many, a place where people can come to find peace and quiet. A pastor has come here often to prepare sermons, and a high school teacher uses the space to write lessons.

Candlelight and Memories even went Hollywood when a Hallmark movie used the storefront as a filming location for the movie The Russel Girl, starring Amber Tamblyn.

It has also been home to meetings for the BIA, Prayer Breakfast, and Markham Fair Committee. In fact, the inaugural meeting of investors of the Stouffville Free Press took place at a tea table! With her creative spirit Pat has held many craft workshops, bridal showers, and even sold tickets for the Christmas tour and other local events.

'Mama Pat'

Since coming to Stouffville in 1976, Pat has become a guiding light in the community. She began her career as a teacher, then focused on having a family. In her spare time she met with neighbours to do crafts and flower arranging, which she carried over to her business with her workshops and providing flower arrangements for sale.

One day at her church, the congregation was challenged to get more involved within the community, to help others and meet new people. Pat rose to the challenge and began driving seniors to appointments

with CHATS. Eventually, she was asked to help care for them at home and took one of the very first Personal Support Worker courses ever offered. She would support so many throughout the day, but as soon as her kids were home she was sure to be there for them.

A rewarding moment at Candlelight and Memories for her was when some of the seniors she supported would visit from Bloomington Cove. It was special to have tea time for those she cared so deeply for, and was in awe that despite dementia and alzheimer's, as soon as she played hymns while serving tea, they would all sing along.

It is no surprise that she has received the Whitchurch-Stouffville Small Business of the Year and the Entrepreneur of the Year Award throughout her career as a business owner. And if you are thinking of taking the leap of owning your own business like she did, her advice is to remember it is not a 9 to 5, Monday to Friday job. Even after long days her lights would stay on as she watered flowers or cleaned the ice cream machine. And it is all worth it "because people are counting on you and you're a part of the community."

As with any business, Pat faced challenges. One of the biggest was Covid-19 and the way it impacted every facet of her shop. She had to close, and even moved to e-commerce as much as possible. Even now, it impacted high tea numbers, and the way that people shop.

Yet, through it all, Pat has always been

of service, caring for others with a genuine heart and open arms. And now, she has come fondly known as Mama Pat.

Saying Goodbye

With the news that Pat will be retiring and Candlelight and Memories will close, it has brought many tears. Happy tears for all the great times this place has brought, and sad tears because they will miss Pat and all this shop means to them.

"The people have been the best part of the business," Pat says, "the community has been so supportive, and I love all the people here." She will also miss the building itself. Since the day she peered in the windows imagining all it could become if it was hers, Pat loved how cozy and comforting the place is.

Pat will be spending more time with her family in retirement, as well as enjoying time by the pool reading. While she is soaking up the sunshine and hopefully going on a cruise, she wants her valued customers to always know that "I appreciate your support over the years, and will try to keep in touch as much as I can."

Keep an eye out in the coming weeks for the candles in the windows being blown out one at a time each week in countdown to the closing of Candlelight and Memories on June 28. Be sure to visit before then, to take advantage of her closing sales, and to share your own memories in a keepsake book that Pat can cherish forever.



Mosaic House Nears Completion, Paving the Way for Affordable Housing in Stouffville

As the spring of 2024 unfolds, the Town of Stouffville witnesses significant progress in the construction of Mosaic House, located at 5676 Main Street. This development, steered by Housing York Inc. and supported by York Region housing investments and community collaboration, is a collective effort in addressing the critical need for affordable housing in the region. The project, named Mosaic House to reflect the diversity and unity of its future residents, is on track to provide 97 homes for seniors, families, couples, and individuals by Fall 2024.

The journey of Mosaic House has seen the completion of crucial construction milestones, including site servicing and structural work. The project team is now focused on the installation of exterior insulation, wall panels, and interior finishes, ensuring that the building is not only structurally sound but also welcoming and comfortable for its inhabitants.

Understanding the potential disruptions construction activities can cause, York Region and its partners have implemented measures to minimize impact on the local community. This includes adhering to work schedules that aim to conclude by 5 p.m. daily, extending only when necessary to meet project timelines while complying with local noise by-laws. Additionally, the project places a high priority on safety, encouraging residents to report any construction-related

Communication remains a cornerstone of this project, with ongoing updates and information made available to the public. The initiative represents more than just the construction of a building; it signifies a step forward in creating a more inclusive and supportive community through affordable housing solutions.

As Mosaic House moves closer to welcoming its first residents, it embodies the hope for a future where affordable housing is accessible to all who need it in the York Region and the Town of Stouffville.

> The tour starts in Corner Brook, ends in St. John's and includes performances in at least four venues along the way. We wish them a safe and enjoyable tour of The Rock.


















York Region Transit is Seeking Public Feedback

The following Stouffville services looking to be enhanced

On-Request Stouffville

Anyone can book an On-Request ride, within a certain boundary, to one of five destinations in the Stouffville community (with one more location proposed to be added in 2025). There is no registration required for this service.

The service is available weekdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.-7 p.m. to 11 p.m. Regular YRT fares apply. All YRT fare media will be accepted including PRESTO, the YRT Pay App, Transit App, debit and credit cards, and exact change. Trips may occur anytime during service hours. Request the next available trip or pre-book a pick-up or dropoff anywhere from 45 minutes to one day in advance. For pre-bookings, your trip will be scheduled with a 15-minute pick-up window. Rides may be shared with other travellers.

You can book a ride through the YRT On-Request App or by calling 1-844-667-5327. Trips are provided on a first-come, first-served basis. To use this service, you must live in the Stouffville community, Ballantrae, Churchill, Musselman's Lake or Bloomington areas - York-Durham Line to Highway 48 (McCowan Road as the western boundary in Ballantrae), and St. John's Sideroad to 19th Avenue - and be headed to/from one of the following five locations in the community of Stouffville: Walmart, Michael's No Frills, Downtown Stouffville GO Station, Public Library and Leisure Centre, or East End Corners Plaza. In 2025, YRT is proposing to add Old Elm GO Station to this list. Service would be provided from 6 a.m.-11 p.m. on weekdays to both the Stouffville and Old Elm GO Stations only. With this change, residents will have access to all day connections with GO bus and train service at the GO Stations. In addition, customers can travel for free on YRT to and from the GO Station if they have proof of GO Transit fare, by using PRESTO, credit or debit.

On-Request (MOR) 65+

YRT offers an On-Request transit service for seniors 65 years and older. The service is offered throughout York Region for seniors who want to try taking public transit using a smaller vehicle that picks you up at your home. To book a ride during service hours,

call 1-866-744-1119. Wait for the date and time to be spoken, press '4' then '5' to speak with a Trip Reservationist. The service is available 7 a.m.-2:45 p.m. on weekdays. Senior fare is \$2.40 with PRESTO, YRT Pay App, or Transit App. Cash, debit or credit card fare is \$4.25 (exact change only). You can use this service from anywhere in York Region and trips must be within 5 km of your starting point (e.g. home). You can carry up to four grocery bags.

Mobility On-Request Paratransit

YRT offers door-to-door, shared ride, accessible public transit service for people with disabilities. To use this service, you must meet specific eligibility criteria. Learn more at yrt.ca/en/schedules-andmaps/registration-and-eligibility.aspx

Regular Service

Route 9 - Ninth Line is YRT's regular service in the community of Stouffville. This year, the route will be restructured to provide two-way service and improve frequency. The changes will include new service along Reeves Way Boulevard, Millard Street and Baker Hill Boulevard, but will eliminate service to a section of Hoover Park Drive, near the GO Train rail crossing. Transit frequency will improve to a range of 32 to 42 minutes between trips, and the two-way service will make local cross-town trips more convenient. Current service operates from approximately 6 a.m. -9 p.m. on weekdays.



PREPARING YOUR GARDEN AND GRILL FOR BBQ SEASON

As the days grow longer and the sun and fertility. I start around the end of April shines brighter, it's time to dust off the depending on the weather. grill and embrace the BBQ season. There's something magical about cooking outdoors, surrounded by the aroma of sizzling meats and vegetables. But before you start it is essential to prepare both your garden and your grill for the months ahead.



1. Plan Your BBQ-Friendly Garden:

The key to a great BBQ feast is fresh, flavourful ingredients. What better way to ensure the quality of your produce than by growing your own. Whether you have acres of land or a balcony, there's always room for some herbs and veggies.

Assess Your Space: Take a look at your outdoor area and identify suitable spots for planting. Choose a location that receives plenty of sunlight and has easy access to water.

Select Your Plants: Opt for veggies and herbs that thrive in the warm months and complement BBQ dishes. I grow tomatoes, peppers and zucchini which are excellent choices for grilling, while herbs like basil, rosemary, and thyme add depth to marinades and rubs. I also like to grown beans and broccoli which are protein rich foods.

Prepare the Soil: Before planting, ensure that the soil is nutrient-rich and well-draining. Incorporate compost or organic matter to improve soil structure

Start Planting: Whether you're sowing seeds or transplanting seedlings, follow the instructions on the packet or plant tags for spacing and depth and maintenance.

2. Deep Clean Your Grill:

A clean grill is essential for those perfect sear marks and preventing flare-ups that can ruin your BBQ experience. Before firing up the grill for the first time this season, give it a thorough deep clean:

Gather Your Supplies: You'll need a wire brush, grill cleaner or soapy water, sponge or cloth, and a bucket for rinsing.

Remove Grates and Drip Trays: Take out the cooking grates and any removable drip trays or flavourizer bars. Scrub them with a wire brush to remove built-up grease and debris.

Clean the Interior: Use a grill cleaner or soapy water and a sponge to clean the interior surfaces of the grill, including the burner tubes. Wipe away any residue with a damp cloth.

Check the Burners: Inspect the burner tubes for clogs or damage. Clear any obstructions with a wire brush or pipe cleaner, and replace any worn-out or rusted burners.

Reassemble and Season: Once everything is clean and dry, reassemble the grill and season the grates with a light coating of oil to prevent sticking.

3. Stock Up on Essentials:

No BBQ season would be complete without a well-stocked arsenal of essentials to elevate your outdoor cooking experience. Here's a checklist to ensure you have everything you need:

I come into the office at 6 a.m. and leave at 7 p.m. You learn how to take everything one thing at a time. You could go nuts if you let it bother you." To rest up for the annual deluge of income tax files, Lynn heads off to the Dominican Republic for three weeks every January.

Does she take the job to bed with her at night? "If I have a problem {with a tax return} during the day, normally I'll dream about it at night and I'll find the answer when I get up in the morning. But I sleep better during the tax season because I'm so tired when I get home at night."

With her business having grown in leaps and bounds, Lynn has had to relegate her other passion – making and selling hand crafts – to the status of hobby. For so many interesting people here."

several years her craft making operation, Gimberts Primitives, co-habited the office with the tax preparation service. While she still offers for sale in the office what remains of the fruits of her creative labours, along with the model While the tax season sees the office going airplanes created by her father, she has had to say good bye to the craft shows she used to regularly take part in. "I've always loved crafting. I used to display at eight to ten shows a year including the One of a Kind Show in Toronto. It was a stress reliever. I was a novelty at the craft shows, everybody laughed at me and told me I was using the left and right side of my brain."
